What do you hope to accomplish during your tern in office and how will it benefit the business community? As a Peace Facilitator working daily in Cedar Rapids schools, I've seen how our community's challenges and

opportunities are interconnected. During my term, I will
focus on priorities that directly benefit our community.
Champion workforce development initiatives that

- create stronger pathways between our educational institutions and employers. By bringing together schools, Kirkwood Community College, and businesses, we can develop training programs that prepare students for available jobs while addressing our workforce shortage.
- Work to increase access to affordable childcare, which is both a family issue and an economic one. When parents have reliable childcare, businesses benefit from a more stable, productive workforce and increased labor participation.
- Advocate for infrastructure investments that support business growth while improving community quality of life, making Cedar Rapids more attractive for both talent retention and business recruitment.

When I saw talented young people leaving lowa, I cofounded Our Future—a paid fellowship program that equips emerging leaders with tools to become advocates for justice, sustainability, and equity in our community. This is economic development in action: we invest in people facing barriers by providing livable wages, mentorship, and professional connections, turning brain drain into local innovation. Our fellows become the business leaders, entrepreneurs, and skilled professionals Cedar Rapids needs to thrive.

My approach centers on relationship-building and finding common ground—skills I use every day helping students

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resolve conflicts. I'll bring these same skills to Des Moines to ensure Cedar Rapids receives its fair share of resources and attention.

Promoting bipartisanship and collaboration and encouraging our elected officials to work toward solutions is important to Economic Alliance members. What is your approach in working with people or groups that may disagree with your positions to reach consensus? Please provide examples.

Conflict resolution is my profession. As a Kids First Peace Facilitator at McKinley STEAM Academy, I spend every day bringing together students with different perspectives to find common ground and workable solutions. My approach begins by listening—truly understanding others' concerns and priorities. I've found beneath opposing positions often lie shared interests. For example, when working with students in conflict, I focus on identifying their underlying needs rather than their stated demands, which frequently reveals common ground and resolution.

In the legislature, I would bring stakeholders together early in the policy development process, before positions harden. I believe the best legislation comes from inclusive conversations that consider multiple perspectives.

I'll always be willing to work across the aisle on solutions that benefit Cedar Rapids families. When disagreements arise, I'll focus on our shared interest in community prosperity rather than partisan differences—just as I help students find paths forward despite their differences every day. ★

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What do you hope to accomplish during your tern in office and how will it benefit the business community? In Iowa, there are endowment funds (Endow Iowa Tax Credit, 20024) that benefit the needs of local communities, nonprofits, and charitable organizations. Why would not the state of lowa establish an endowment fund that could be used to directly benefit lowa citizens in a multiplicity of ways? How about an endowment fund (statewide or local community) that could be used to defray the need for property tax or utility cost increases? How about using it to supplement infrastructure renewal, reduce licensing fees, protect natural resources, and lower some health care costs and services? Having worked with individuals and families needing assistance, I would propose a restructuring of the manner in which monetary support is provided. Typically, assistance funds are reduced or suddenly removed as an individual gains more income (exceeding some assistance threshold). Rather than removing the support, driving the recipient to stay (forever) on assistance, why not gradually reduce it, encouraging self sufficiency. And lastly, I have proposed before the Cedar Rapids City Council that several communities in Iowa have gambling casinos. What if we were different, given the history of innovation that is our heritage. I believe that if we pursue the building of a virtual reality venue,

a holodeck (as in Star Trek), "they will come". It would present a myriad of opportunities for entertainment, teaching, training, research, simulation, and marketing. **BACK TO TABLE OF CONTENTS**

My approach is that we need to "come to the table" and explore where we may have areas of agreement and consensus. Depending on the issue(s), it can require some "out of the box" thinking and certainly some willingness to make accommodations and concessions. As an employee of Rockwell Collins, working with both customers and regulatory agencies, I have encountered ample instances of working through "opposing views" to be able to arrive at a unified point.★
